


On the 26th September 2021, the final four Stewartby Chimneys were demolished, marking the end of an era for Stewartby's brick making history.

This social engagement project aims to bring people together to discuss their memories of the brickwork, forming archives for future generations. STEWARTBY MAP








KEY LOCATIONS

Classical architecture can be seen throughout Stewartby, with repeating motifs signifying community and teamwork.





The Social Club has become the main community venue within the village.


This is my main locational focus for the project, as exworkers regularly meet here for the past 40 years. Housing products around the bar can begin conversations about memories of the brickworks.






IMPORTANCE OF COMMUNITY HISTORY


Oral history is the oldest form of historical account, and maintains a great part in today's society. However, once no longer recounted, the history vanishes, increasing the importance of written archives.

For Stewartby, and many other industrial villages, their history lacks official documentation. Yet, these areas were at the forefront of British industry.

"Nobody was rich, we lacked for very little, and in general, it was a happy place."



Began conversation about heritage within the community, through a miniature bricks project.


Returned to the village with prototypes, gaining feedback from residents.

TANKARD


Handmade pint tankards in chimney forms, reminiscent of the individuality of handmade bricks.




Process of plate production for decorative and functional tableware, to instigate conversation and inquiry.

Exploring traditional pub games, I wanted to facilitate conversation, whilst engaging multiple generations.







Engaging in communal discussions are important to a sense of connection within a community.


