
## The Dancing Couple at Number 11.

■ A "boil" animation, to indicate the steady movement of a bicycle.




# The Jazz player



#### The Cat Lover




■ The house opposite has a ginger tabby cat who sits on the windowsill without fail everyday.

#### Feedback from research:

- "Someone has to interact, so it's a customer based app- they need to know what they will get out of it."
- Also, could have great relevance to highlight the issue of homelessness and the housing crisis. The idea of having an 'empty', 'forgotten' or 'derelict' GIF for those houses without occupancy, would make the public question why.
- One person said it reminded them of an advert for a charity which would highlight those issues.


