Francis and myself have steadily added references since that year, with a final major search by myself in the spring of this year in which I was joined by Malculm Page who produced a mass of additions to the bibliography.

This by no means a complete bibliography. It is very nearly comprehensive for the period up to 1966. From then on reviews in the following

areas have still to be researched:

1) the popular daily and Sunday newspapers (Express, Mirror, News of the World, etc)

2) local papers, expecially from the north
3) political papers (Morning Star, etc)

We could very much welcome help in researching in these areas for a future definitive edition.

However, with those stated exceptions, we still have a very substantial bibliography of the writings by and about David Mercer. In view of the increasing interest in his plays I felt that we should publish what has been compiled rather than waiting for several years until we had neared that elusive 'completeness'. That is also the reason why this is a duplicated publication. We hope to produce the definitive edition in the late seventies.

There is very little American material included. Indeed Malcolm Page was unable to locate any reviews of the two plays published in the U.S. (Ride a Cock Horse and Belcher's Luck) nor of Doll's House which was seen in Canada on television on December 23rd, 1973. There is even less foreign language material. In spite of the German translation of Flint, the only reference I was able to trace was one in Russian.

The title has been used twice before. In a review of After Haggerty by Kenneth Hurren in the Spectator in 1971, and in another view on Duck Song by Hugh Hebert in the Guardian in 1974. In view of the range of David Mercer's writing it seemed the obvious title for the bibliography.

It only remains for me to welcome any additions to this bibliography. Please send them to me at Smoothie.
