Who is Rosa Parks?

Rosa Louise McCauley Parks was born on February 4, 1913 and died on October 24, 2005. She was African-American and was called "the first lady of civil rights", and "the mother of the freedom movement". Rosa Parks' first event in her fight for civil rights was in Montgomery, Alabama. On December 1, 1955, Parks refused to obey bus driver James Blake's order that she give up her seat to make room for a white passenger. This disobedience sparked the Montgomery Bus Boycott. It became an important symbol of the modern Civil Rights Movement and Parks became an international icon of resistance to racial segregation. She organised and collaborated with civil rights leaders, including boycott leader Martin Luther King, Jr., helping to launch him to national prominence in the civil rights movement.
